The International Confederation of Childhood Cancer Parent Organizations (ICCCPO) ...

- is a global parent driven organisation;
- represents over 160 parent organisations from all continents;
- is the only non-medical, world-wide, childhood cancer organisation representing families of children with cancer and childhood cancer survivor groups;
- works in partnership with health and medical professionals (such as SIOP), international organisations (such as UICC, WHO), governments, policy makers and civil society organisations to raise awareness and create support for children with cancer.

What we do

- Provide an international network of childhood cancer support groups.
- Provide assistance and guidance in the establishment of new childhood cancer groups, particularly in low- and middle-income countries.
- Provide childhood cancer organisations with information about the disease, treatment and effects in understandable, non-medical language.
- Provide forums, events and opportunities for members to meet and share information, experience and knowledge with other members.
- Be a powerful advocate for the issues and effects of childhood cancer at an international level including:
 - ▶ early diagnosis,
 - ▶ access to drugs and early treatment,
 - ▶ long-term impact on survivors (medically, socially and financially)

- Encourage the development of survivor groups around the world. The International Childhood Cancer Survivors Network (ICCSN) is a part of ICCCPO. It connects adult childhood cancer survivor groups globally.
- Support and improve childhood cancer care in low- and middle-income countries through among others twinning projects.
- Raise awareness of childhood cancer needs worldwide, especially on International Childhood Cancer Day (ICCD) – the 15th of February.
